Sheryl J. LeJeune, 70, of Troy, Missouri, passed away surrounded by her family on Tuesday, June 9, 2026, at SSM St. Joseph Hospital West in Lake St. Louis, Missouri. She was born on January 12, 1956, in Paragould, Arkansas, and was the daughter of Clarence Franklin and Nancy Pearlina (May) Barnhill.

Early in life, she completed cosmetology school, where she began building not only a career, but a life centered around hard work and caring for others. After earning her certification, she and her husband opened Main Street Salon in Moscow, which she proudly and successfully operated for 20 years while raising a family. She cherished every moment with them—spoiling them, making memories, and especially those special sleepovers with her granddaughters and road trips with grandsons. She took a genuine interest in their everyday lives and made each one feel deeply loved and important.

Sheryl was a fighter through and through—strong, compassionate, and unwavering. She was the one you could count on, the one who showed up, and the one who stood beside you when you needed her most.

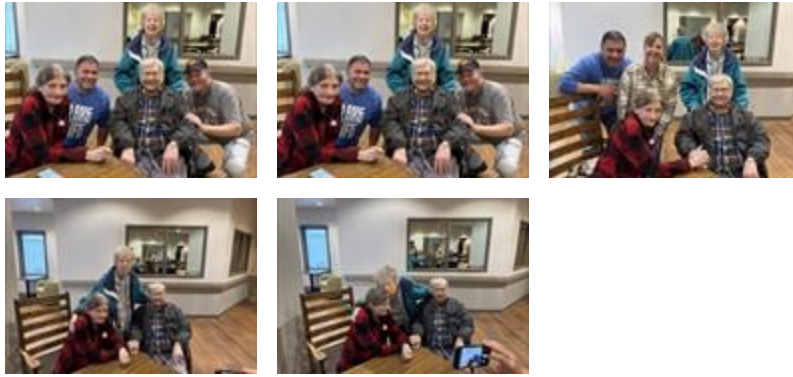
